Investing In Our Future

Communities throughout the state of Wisconsin granted members of the Wisconsin Society of Pharmacy Students the privilege of serving them this year. As student pharmacists, it was an honor serving and caring for a diverse group of individuals within our state. WSPS members responded to community needs with more passion and dedication than ever expected. The WSPS goals and objectives for the 2006-2007 academic year in the area of patient care included:

- Promoting inter-professional collaboration with other health care students.
- Providing opportunities for community involvement.
- Increasing member participation by offering a variety of activities...especially those dealing with patient care initiatives.
- Establishing a closer relationship with faculty and staff.
- Expanding the already established activities in which the chapter is involved.

Operation Diabetes (OD) set an amazing pace at the beginning of the year and upheld it for the duration of the year. After two intensive training sessions, OD began hosting screenings at local pharmacies and giving presentations around the community. School-aged children through senior citizens were educated on issues concerning Type

2 diabetes and healthy lifestyle choices. The flagship project of the year was the **Operation Diabetes Triple Screening** hosted at three different sites throughout the city, co-hosted by OD and the Minority Affairs Program in Pharmacy. Through this partnership, 76 patients were screened in four different languages: English, Spanish, Hmong and Chinese! Over the course of the year, OD educated well over 8200 individuals.

Operation Immunization (OI) also hosted patient-focused initiatives this year. Through their initiatives, members served individuals in each of the 72 counties in Wisconsin. This was accomplished through **Immunization Clinics** in campus dormitories, local malls and pharmacies in multiple areas of the state and an effective media campaign. Through OI's extensive educational campaign, individuals of all economic and cultural backgrounds were reached with the message about the benefits of immunization, how to get immunized and the dangers to public health of not being immunized.

The program that best addressed the goals established by the WSPS Executive Board was **MEDiC**. Through this incredibly innovative program, student pharmacists joined medical, physical therapy, physician assistant and nursing students to collaborate in the acute and chronic care of patients in underserved communities. Student volunteers, with physician guidance, directly participated in patient care that emphasized the social and economic conditions influencing the health of those being

served. This year, MEDiC attracted the largest percentage of WSPS members to participate in its weekly clinics. With 119 clinics attended by students, approximately 695 individuals were directly affected by the services that students provided.

This year the WSPS Executive Board stepped up to the challenge and took patient care to a new level. In addition to the traditional screenings and clinics, WSPS became involved in *new patient care initiatives*. These projects allowed student pharmacists to reach a much broader population than ever before.

In November, in a new pilot program, Operation Asthma and IPSF collaborated to distribute patient care packs to local pharmacies for the **Great American Smokeout**. It was the perfect way to build new relationships with pharmacies within the community, in addition to initiating our new smoking cessation focus group.

Community Outreach established three new patient care initiatives this year. The first event was the **Folic Acid Awareness Campaign**. Through a partnership with March of Dimes, student pharmacists distributed Folic Acid Awareness packets to pharmacies throughout the state. Packets contained information concerning the importance of folic acid for women of childbearing age, a poster for the pharmacy, stickers to place on Combined Oral Contraceptive prescriptions and buttons for the pharmacist to wear.

Students hosted a booth at a local health fair to provide information on the importance of folic acid, as well as the importance of patients knowing their medications and what questions to ask their pharmacists. Since students interacted primarily with seniors, they also discussed with them the importance of folic acid for their daughters and granddaughters of childbearing age.

On Valentine's Day, Community Outreach hosted three blood pressure stations in Hilldale Mall for their **Go Red for Women Blood Pressure Screening** event. About 10 pharmacy students participated and in 7 hours, 74 individuals were screened. In each screening, patients' blood pressure and heart rate were taken, along with an assessment of their current blood pressure medications. Students also talked with patients about lifestyle modifications for blood pressure control such as low salt diets and exercise.

Later in the semester, student pharmacists participated in the **Head and Neck Cancer Awareness Health Fair at the UW Hospital**. Students provided a handout for patients about questions all patients should ask their pharmacist and displayed a tri-fold entitled "Know Your Medications." The tri-fold contained information on appropriate medication use and tips for taking medications safer and easier. Students talked about tobacco cessation and answered questions patients had about their medications. Students also participated in a water tasting event hosted for the cancer patients in attendance.

Lastly, WSPS traveled to 16 elementary schools and daycares around Madison giving **Poison Prevention Presentations**. Student pharmacists utilized creative ways of educating children on the dangers of misusing medications and other dangerous materials in a household. These included a puppet show, poison bingo game and the poison recognition game, "Safe to eat or not?". Students spent time learning what each child already knew concerning poison prevention and adapted their presentations accordingly. Each child left with a take-home packet to share with their parents and with the mission to teach their brothers and sisters about these dangers.

This year, WSPS was able to expand its reach even further into the surrounding communities. Faculty and staff from the School of Pharmacy added a new dimension to the way that we were able to serve our community. By teaching us how to best communicate with our patients and adapt to each individual's needs accordingly, WSPS members were able to provide high quality and incredibly pertinent services to each individual.
